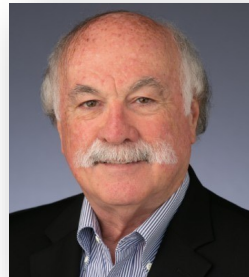
## Big Sir's Corner

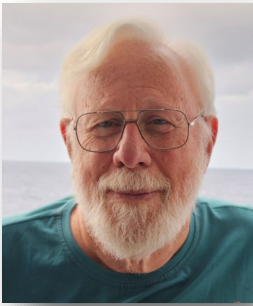

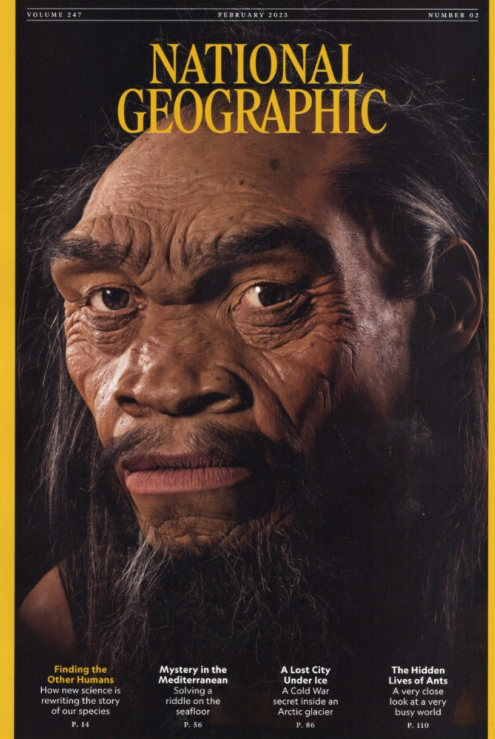

To quote a famous fictional character most of you will recognize, "Live long and prosper."



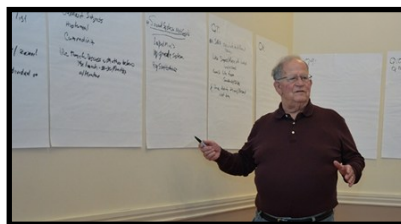

## Hiking

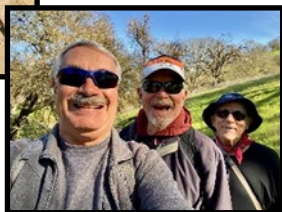

Fishing was slow this month. We can put up with the rain, but the wind makes it difficult. The big event this month was the annual opening of San

Pablo Reservoir, which began operations on February 7. We are looking to catch lots of trout and catfish there and perhaps the sturgeon that **Dick Thomson** has landed twice might reappear. The Department of Fish and Wildlife also announced the rockfish regulations for 2025. The season will begin on April 1, and we can fish from boats at depths of 300 feet or more in April, October, and December. From May to September and in November, we can only fish from boats in depths less than 300 feet. In addition, one can fish from the shore at any time. We are anxiously awaiting the announcement of salmon regulations. The salmon season has been closed for two years, but rumor has it that there will be a short season in either July or August.

Even with San Pablo closed until recently, trout fishing was the main focus of the group. **Carl Moyer** caught nine trout on two trips to Contra Loma Reservoir, one with **Gordon Linebaugh** and the other with **Zbig Mrozek**. However, an outing at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir produced nothing. **Bob Lively** caught a big trout in Contra Loma and **Dennis Lee** and **Stan Wong** had some luck fishing for trout at Shadow Cliffs and Contra Loma. **Tom Stefanski** tried out his new rod and reel at Contra Loma but failed to reel in any fish.

Out in the Delta, **Ron Lew**, **Ken Bellindir**, and **Eric Finson** had a great day hauling in a boatload of starry flounder.

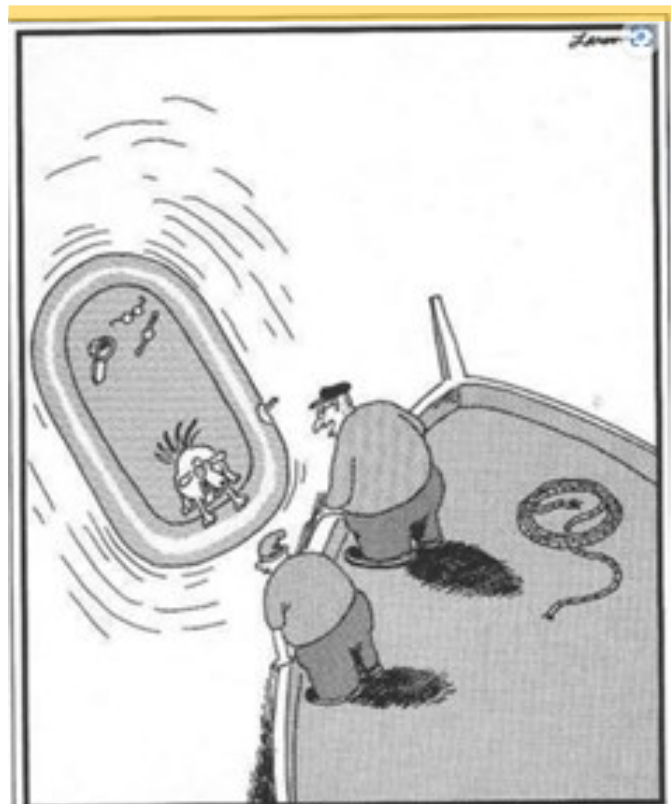

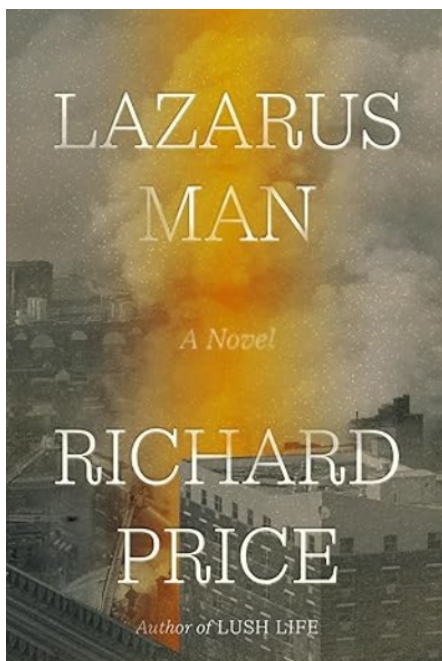
### Book Review – Jan '25 **Lazarus Man – Richard Price**

The SIR 146 Book group held its January meeting and we reviewed our book of the month 'Lazarus

Man' by Richard Price. Each month we also discuss what's new with SIR, what we've been up to and towards the end of the meeting we have a discussion and vote on our next book to read. It seems as though there are more and more worthy books both in the fiction and non-fiction categories for us to undertak... even in retirement, so much to do and not enough time.

### Musings

This month the group also answered the question 'Why do we read books?' in this time when there's so many other ways to get information and be amused or entertained. There were a number of responses to the question but there was a common thread in our responses that reading books, while entertaining, was an important avenue to learning and understanding history. There was also the observation that many people working in technical areas, where reading for work was a significant time constraint, didn't have the time to read for fun until they transitioned to retirement. I did do that as someone who always dreamed of being in a book club but never had the time to look for one and also didn't have the time, consistently, to read books beyond my reading for work which included finance, economics and programming.



### The Book

This month's book, which was fiction, was about the collapse of an apartment building in East Harlem in 2008. The author was inspired to write the novel after an East Harlem gas explosion in 2014 which caused multiple buildings to collapse and killed eight people. Price lived near the collapsed building and spent time observing the scene.

The book tells the intertwining stories of four primary characters involved in one way or another with the aftermath of the blast, while also providing a feel for everyday life in New York's East Harlem neighborhood. The primary characters were:

Anthony Carter—whose apparent miraculous survival (the Lazarus Man), after being buried for days beneath tons of brick and stone, transforms him into a man with a message, a passionate sense of mission, but also leaving him with some serious spiritual questions.

Felix Pearl—a young transplant to the city wanders the crash site and neighborhood streets coming into contact with a variety of interesting and at times sad characters. His photography and film work on that day provokes, in this previously unformed soul, a sharp sense of personal destiny.

Royal Davis—the owner of a failing Harlem funeral home, whose desperate trolling of the scene for potential "customers" triggers a quest to find another path in life.

Mary Roe—a veteran city detective who has been relegated to a position in the Community Affairs division is dropped into the morass of wreckage, survivors and the unaccounted for following the tenement collapse. In this role she is driven, in part by her own family's brutal history, and becomes obsessed with finding Christopher Diaz, one of the building's missing tenants.

The author follows these four characters in the days following the collapse providing a real glimpse of life on the edge where people are dealing every day with financial hardships, crime, the aftermath of incarceration and government bureaucracies or services that don't always fit their needs. While the author starts out telling four distinct stories only connected by the building collapse, he brings the characters and their stories together thru the pages of the book. The novel is not cynical and ends on a generally positive note with one unexpected twist.

The author has had previous success as a novelist, including the books "Clockers" and "Lush Life". Additionally, he has shown considerable skill writing screen plays for film and TV including the screen play for "The Color of Money" and as a writer for the acclaimed series "The Wire".

### Recommendation

The groups opinion on the book was somewhat mixed and the consensus was that we couldn't give it a solid recommendation. Criticisms included 'a contrived ending', 'tedious read' and a 'characters not developed'. That said, some of the group thought that the book provided a real sense of New York street life and Harlem in particular. Additionally, some thought the author's phrasing was unique and noteworthy.

Next months book is "Over the Edge of the World", the story of Magellan's terrifying circumnavigation of the globe. I love books about the ocean, maritime activities and history so I'm very excited to read it.
